Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation – Training Grants (Round 1)

Internal closing date: 12 January 2010

External closing date: 19 January 2010

JDRF provides funding for research related to type 1 diabetes and one or more of the [JDRF research emphasis areas](#). Applications are accepted from any country and there are no citizenship requirements. To be eligible for JDRF Training Grants, applicants must hold a doctoral degree (MD, PhD) or equivalent at the time of award activation.

Postdoctoral Fellowships – designed to attract qualified, promising scientists entering their professional career in the diabetes research field. At the time of activating the award, the applicant must have held a doctoral degree or the equivalent for no more than five years, must not be serving an internship or residency and may not have faculty appointments. Postdoctoral Fellowships are for two years, valued at US\$42,868 - \$52,960 per year, depending on years of relevant postdoctoral experience.

Advanced Postdoctoral Fellowships – designed to attract qualified and promising health scientists, to provide an opportunity to receive full time research training, and to assist in the transition from a fellowship to an independent position. At the time of activating the award, the applicant must have held a doctoral degree or the equivalent for no more than five years and must not be serving an internship or residency. Applicants who have completed 1-3 years of postdoctoral training may wish to apply for this ‘advanced’ award. The Advanced Postdoctoral Fellowship is targeted to those who would benefit from postdoctoral training in preparation for later faculty appointments. Fellowships will be awarded for up to three years, valued at up to US\$90,000 per year.

Career Development Awards – to provide an opportunity for scientists early in their faculty careers to establish themselves in areas that reflect the [JDRF research emphasis areas](#) and to position themselves at the leading edge of type 1 diabetes research. Although JDRF is especially interested in fostering careers in clinical investigation, Career Development Awards may emphasise either basic or clinical topics. Applicants must have received their doctoral degree at least three but no more than seven years before the award and hold an academic faculty-level position at the time of application. The award is up to US\$150,000 per year including indirect costs, for a period of five years. Funds may be used for a research allowance, which can

include a technician, supplies, equipment and travel up to US\$2,000. per year. The awards are renewable up to a maximum of four years, pending satisfactory progress reports.

Early-Career, Patient-Oriented Diabetes Research Awards – provides support to investigators to plan to pursue a career in diabetes-related clinical investigation. Applicants must have an MD or PhD, hold an appointment or joint appointment in a subspecialty of clinical medicine and conduct human clinical research. Awards are in the amount of US\$150,000 per year including indirect costs, for a period of five years. Up to US\$75,000 of this may be requested for research allowance, including travel up to US\$2,000 per year.

National Alliance for Research on Schizophrenia and Depression (NARSAD) – 2010 Young Investigator Awards

Internal closing date: 18 January 2010

External closing date: 25 January 2010

NARSAD's Young Investigator Award Program provides support for the most promising young scientists conducting neurobiological research. One and two year awards up to US\$30,000 per year are provided to enable early career investigators to either extend research fellowship training or begin careers as independent research faculty. Basic, as well as translational and/or clinical investigators are supported, but research must be relevant to serious psychiatric disorders such as schizophrenia, mood disorders, anxiety disorders, or child and adolescent psychiatric disorders. NARSAD will also support clinical grants which can include careful studies using qualitative research approaches or research generating preliminary data to explore a new hypothesis generated by clinical experience or large sample studies. These awards are not sufficient to support expensive large sample patient-based studies but it may be possible to attach a study to a clinical project already under way or for which other funding has become available.

The Cardiac Society of Australia and New Zealand – CSANZ / CSL Biotherapies Interventional Fellowship Award

Internal closing date: 22 January 2010

External closing date: 29 January 2010

Applications are invited for an Interventional Fellowship Award, provided by CSL Biotherapies. The award is specifically designed to assist a young member of the Society to undertake training or research in interventional cardiology at an overseas centre. The award is valued at AU\$30,000 and to be used to provide salary support for a research / training position relevant to interventional cardiology in an overseas institution. Applicants should be citizens or permanent residents of Australia or New Zealand and should be eligible for medical registration in Australia or New Zealand. Recipients will currently be undertaking, or have completed within the last 5 years, advanced training in Cardiology recognised by the RACP/CSANZ Specialist Training Committee (STC) in Cardiology.
